Admissions

Barber Styling, Cosmetology, Cosmo/Barbering, Instructor Training, and Massage Therapy students may enroll with a High School Diploma or GED. Instructor Training students must hold a current Florida Cosmetology license AND have 2 years salon experience. Facial - Skin Care, Full Specialty, Manicuring-Nail Extension I and II, may enroll with a High School Diploma, GED. Effective January 2006, students without a high school diploma or GED may enroll by passing the Wonderlic Basic Skills Test. The approved passing scores on this test are as follows: Verbal (200) and Quantitative (210).

The course instructs the student in barber practices and state law related to the profession. In addition to classroom theory, the student performs barber services.

Completion Time

Full time students attending 20 hours a week, complete the program in 30 weeks. Available class schedule is Monday – Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

Part time schedule is available – minimum 12 hours per week.

Full Specialty students receiving financial aid must be in school a minimum of 25 weeks (24 hours per week maximum).

Course Description

Satisfactory Progress Policy

Satisfactory Academic Progress and attendance is a requirement that must be met by all students whether receiving Federal Assistance or not. Students who meet the minimum requirements for attendance and academic progress shall be considered to be making satisfactory progress until the next scheduled evaluations, and are eligible to receive Title IV assistance. The length of the probation is 30 days. Students may have two consecutive probationary periods; after two consecutive probation periods, the student may be terminated. A student on probation is considered to be making satisfactory progress. Students who do not meet the minimum requirements for attendance and academic satisfactory progress will

be placed on probation. At Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc., Satisfactory Progress for 240 clock hour students are evaluated at the end of 120, and 240 clock hours. 600 hour students are evaluated at 200, 400, and 600 hours. 1200 hour students are evaluated at 300, 600, 900, and 1200 clock hours. 1500 hour students are evaluated at 300, 600, 900, 1200, and 1500 hours.

Satisfactory Progress Standards

1. An overall theory grade average of 80% or higher and passing grades in practical skills must be maintained. If a student does not meet this they are given remedial training in the areas needing improvement. The student is re-tested and the grades are averaged together.
2. A cumulative monthly attendance average of 75% of contracted hours must be maintained. All students must complete program within the maximum time frame (See below). Only students who maintain satisfactory progress are eligible to receive Title IV assistance.
3. A student returning from a Leave of Absence will return at the same satisfactory progress status as they were prior to the Leave of Absence. A Leave of Absence extends the student's contract and the maximum time frame by the same number of days in the Leave of Absence.

Re-establishing Eligibility For Financial Aid Funds

To re-establish eligibility for financial aid, the student must bring his/her theory and/or attendance and/or practical skills levels up to satisfactory standards as specified in numbers 1 and 2 above.

Maximum Time Frame

To remain eligible for federal funds and be making Satisfactory Progress, students must complete their program within a specified period of time, or maximum time frame. Upon enrollment, each student will be informed of their maximum

time frame to complete the program. The maximum time frame shall not exceed 1.3 times the number of clock hours required to complete the program. At each evaluation period attendance of student will be evaluated as to their ability to complete the program in the maximum time frame. In the event that a student must change their contracted schedule, the student's maximum time frame will be adjusted accordingly.

At each evaluation period attendance of students will be evaluated as to their ability to complete the program in the maximum time frame. Probation will apply only to the 300 and 900 hour evaluation.

The estimated completion time of a part time student is double that of a full time student. Therefore, maximum time frame must be calculated accordingly. **Example:** Stan is a part time day cosmetology student contracted 15 hours per week to complete the 1200 hour program. His estimated completion time is 80 weeks, his maximum time frame is 104 weeks (80 x 1.3). All time is rounded to the nearest whole number.

600 hour students are contracted for 28 hours a week, therefore their maximum time frame will be different.

Appeal Procedure

The appeal must be done in writing to the administrative office. Reason for this appeal, circumstances to warrant considerations and specific methods that will correct the deficiency must be documented. The Administrator will consider the circumstances and determine whether the student may remain in the school. The next evaluation period the student must make satisfactory progress.

Attendance Policy

Students must Clock In and Out on the computer in their Education Center. All attendance hours will be rounded to the nearest quarter hour. A student must maintain a minimum of 75% of his or her contracted hours. Student's attendance will be monitored monthly.

Absences

Students are allowed three unexcused absences per calendar month. Day students must report absences by 8:00 a.m., Night students by 4:00 p.m. and Weekend Students by 9:00 a.m.

Excused absences are:

- An illness with a doctor's note.
- A child's illness with a doctor's note.
- Court with proper documentation.

Leave of Absences

Leave of Absences are temporary interruptions of training at the request of the student for personal reasons. The request may be made in writing, by e-mail or by phone and approved by Administration. A leave of absence request must be a minimum of 10 days and a maximum of 60 days. A student is allowed a total of 60 days leave of absence during their program. Such a leave will not result in additional tuition, as we will extend graduation and maximum time frame dates accordingly. Veterans must be terminated for VA pay purposes.

Program Change Policy

- Program changes from nights to days or days to nights are allowed one time.
- Schedule changes are allowed three times during your program with permission from office staff.

Personal Services

Students may receive personal services in their department if they meet the below criteria.

- Personal services may be performed after 12:30 p.m. for day and weekend classes and 7:30 p.m. for night class.
- Each student is allowed one personal service per week.
- You must receive prior permission from your instructor and have the ability to pay for supplies used.
- A student may not receive personal services if they have had an unexcused absence that week or a tardy on the day of requested services.

Breaks and Meals Policy

- A clock hour is 50 minutes of instruction and ten minutes of break.
- A student may utilize their break time as two ten-minute breaks and one 30-minute meal break (if earned).
- Breaks and meals may be taken only after receiving permission from your instructor.
- Students must clock out for break and will receive clock hours for this time if they return within the specified time allowed.

Grading Procedure

The following factors will be measured to determine academic progress:

Theory Tests
Outlines, Workbooks
Practical Exams
Clinic Work
Graded Assignments
Projects

The minimum acceptable grade for any theory is 80%. All practical skills are graded on a pass/fail system.

Anyone with a score below 80% must bring the score up before being allowed to graduate. If desired, they can review the work in another class. Tests can be retaken one time, any days as class and clinic assignments permit.

Grading Scale:

100 – 90 = A (Excellent)

89 – 80 = B (Average)

79 or below = C (Below Average)

P = Passing (must be 80 or above)

F = Fail (79 or below)

Progress Test/Reports

Progress reports/tests, for 1500 hour programs, are distributed at the following hour levels: 300, 600, 900, 1200 and 1500 hours; 1200 hour programs at 300, 600, 900 and 1200 hours; 600 hour programs at 200, 400 and 600 hours; 360 hour programs at 120, 240 and 360 hours; and 240 hour programs at 120 and 240 hours. To meet satisfactory progress an individual must maintain a minimum of 80%. If an individual does not meet this they are given remedial training in the areas needing improvement and a retest is given. The grades are then averaged. If this is not accomplished, training will be interrupted and no further financial aid may be disbursed. Grading system (100-70) is the minimum grade considered satisfactory.

Student Records

It is the policy of the school to offer any students the right to access their files. This must be done between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Any copies a student may wish will be provided to them at no additional charge. If a student is out of state, a notarized written request must be sent to the school.

"Student's records are permanently maintained." Records of academic progress may be furnished to students, **this does not include time sheets**. A compilation of the student's time will be recorded on a counseling sheet and provided to the student.

Veteran's Policies

We are State approved for Veteran's training. For Veterans, excused absences will be granted for extenuating circumstances only, and will be substantiated by entries in a student's files. Early departures, class cuts, tardies, etc. for any portion

of an hour will be counted as a full hour absence. Students exceeding three days of unexcused absences in a calendar month will be terminated for VA pay purposes, for unsatisfactory attendance. Make-up work will be scheduled by the teacher.

Breaks – see School Rule #9 (page 20).

Barber-Styling, Cosmetology, Cosmetology/Barber-Styling, Full Specialty, Instructor Training and Massage Therapy

VA students falling below an 80% average at the end of a calendar month will be put on academic probation for one month. At the end of the probation month, the VA will be notified to terminate benefits if the student has not attained an 80% average. A veteran student terminated for unsatisfactory progress may be re-certified to the VA after attaining satisfactory progress at the end of a monthly evaluation period.

Manicuring/Nail Extension and Facial/Skin Care

VA students falling below an 80% average at the end of a weekly evaluation period will be put on academic probation for one week. At the end of the probation week, the VA will be notified to terminate benefits if the student has not attained an 80% average. A veteran student terminated for unsatisfactory progress may be re-certified to the VA after attaining satisfactory progress at the end of a weekly evaluation period.

Student Visa (I-20 MN)

B.I.S.B. is authorized by the United States Department of Immigration (INS) to offer the I-20 Student Visa. There is a non-refundable \$250 administration fee for the service.

Withdrawal

Withdrawal is when a student drops out of school or the school terminates the student's enrollment. The student is required to pay for scheduled or actual hours up to the last day of attendance, calculated under the student's contract. Most important, if a student should desire later to re-enroll, our policy is to assist such students in any way possible to enable time to complete a program. Students who were making Satisfactory Progress will be considered to be doing so upon their return. Students who were not, or who were dismissed for unsatisfactory progress, must interview with the administration office and financial aid before readmission.

Advising

Academic advising is provided to all students at each evaluation period.

Mental Health referral is available to all students if required at any other time. (Seminars may be scheduled focusing on drugs, alcohol, AIDS, etc.)

Students in crisis are referred to the Harbor Behavioral Health Care institute, located at 8002 King Helie Blvd., New Port Richey, FL. The building number is 8002 (Multipurpose Building). A student in crisis may be evaluated, interviewed and given directions for a counseling service.

Campus Security

Campus security policies statistics are available upon request in the office. Campus is monitored by a surveillance system.

Housing

Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. does not provide housing. There are many apartments to rent near the school. We are happy to assist out of town, state or out of country students.

Grievance Procedure

Students are urged to communicate any problems they may have with the school, employees, or other students to one of the owners, preferably in writing. If a satisfactory resolution of the matter is not reached within the administration, the student may request a hearing before outside (neutral) members of the school's Advisory Board. If the Advisory Board's decision is still not satisfactory to the student may file a complaint with the Commission for Independent Education at 1-888-224-6684.

Graduation Requirements

In order to graduate, a student must complete theory and practical workbooks, graduation project, clinic services, pass a written theory and a written practical examination with an 80% aver-

age, and complete all financial arrangements. Upon completion the student will receive a diploma from the school.

** All students may schedule an appointment with the office manager to complete testing and/or license applications.*

Policy on Academic Remediation

Students who are admitted to Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. are given the following instructions if the student finds it necessary to obtain extra academic assistance with any program.

The administration will set up specific times during the day or night, not to interfere with theory hours or practical skills, to overview material necessary for remediation. The total hours necessary for remediation are determined on an individual basis. Assignments given to the student in need may be completed as homework at school during the student's free time. Any students that let their grades fall below 80% must be remediated.

Placement Services

Student information board is provided where job opportunities are posted. Prior to graduation all students are counseled as to jobs in which they wish to apply for. The school however, does not guarantee job employment, and makes no statements to the fact that after graduation a job is guaranteed.

Make-Up Policy

Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. is open Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. - 10:00 p.m. and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Our students are expected to come to school according to their contract. If for any reason a student needs to be excused, he will be expected to make arrangements with the teacher to make up the time the following week between 2:00 and 10:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Massage Therapy students must make up a missed clinic day on another clinic day. There are no exceptions.

Reserved Rights

Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. reserves the right to make changes in the policies, procedures, schedules and other provisions in this catalog in order to enhance the educational quality and effectiveness of the Institute. Students will always be given notification of any policy change.

Tuition and fees are subject to change without notice.

Cancellation and Refund Policy

Should the student withdraw, be terminated or cancel for any reason, all refunds will be made according to the following schedule:

Return of Title IV

Determines the amount of Title IV aid a student has earned. The unearned portion is returned. If a recipient of Title IV aid withdraws during a payment period, the institution must calculate the amount of Title IV aid the student did not earn. Unearned Title IV funds must be returned to the Title IV program. If a student withdraws after 60% of any payment period there will be no refund.

***REFUND DISTRIBUTION IS AS FOLLOWS:**

Direct Loan Programs, Pell Grant Programs, any remaining funds will be disbursed to the student.

Cancellation & Refund Policy

1. Any monies due the student will be refunded within 30 days of official cancellation or withdrawal (with the exception of a \$50 non-refundable application fee). Or if:
 - a. the student is not accepted, or is expelled from the school.
 - b. a student (or in the case of a student under legal age, his/her parent or guardian) cancels his/her contract and demands his/her money back in writing, within three business days of the signing of the enrollment agreement or contract. In this case all monies collected by the school shall be refunded except an application fee of \$50.00. This policy applies regardless of whether or not the student has actually started training.
 - c. a student cancels his/her contract and

demands his/her money back in writing, after three business days of the signing of the enrollment agreement or contract, but prior to entering classes. In this case, he/she shall be entitled to a refund of all monies paid to the school less an application fee of \$50.00.

- d. a student on an approved leave of absence notifies the school that he or she will not be returning. The date of withdrawal shall be the earlier of the date of expiration of the leave of absence or the date the student notifies the institution that the student will not be returning.
- e. a student notifies the school of his or her withdrawal by written notification. The cancellation date will be noted by post-mark or hand delivery.
- f. if the program is cancelled prior to the student's enrollment, the school will provide a full refund.
- g. if the school permanently closes, the student will receive a pro-rata refund or arrangements would be made for the student to train at another facility.
- h. Institution Refund Policy - For students who enroll in and begin classes, the following schedule of tuition adjustment will be considered to meet minimum standards for refunds:

- i. Books and supplies are non-refundable. If a student withdraws he/she will be responsible for the cost of the books, scrubs and supplies (if applicable) for the program.
- 2. Any monies due the student who unofficially withdraws or does not return from a leave of absence, will be refunded within 30 days of a determination by the school that the student has withdrawn. To determine unofficial withdrawals, the school will monitor each student's progress.
- 3. The school will evaluate mitigating circumstances in each refund calculation.
- 4. Collection Policy: All past due accounts will be referred to a collection agency.
- 5. B.I.S.B. does not charge a termination fee.

The below school rules must be adhered to or a written warning will be issued. Warnings are accumulated throughout a student's program. The warning will be written and reviewed by office staff with the student.

- Three warnings will result in a one day suspension.
- Six warnings will result in a three-day suspension.
- Nine warnings will result in a one week suspension.
- 12 warnings are grounds for termination.

BISB reserves the right to suspend or terminate a student if their conduct is so severe a reprimand stronger than a warning is warranted in order to ensure the educational quality and effectiveness of the school.

1. Students must adhere to the Attendance Policy. See page 15 for details.
2. Students must adhere to the Dress Code Policy. See page 1 for details.
3. Day students must park in the back areas designated for them.
4. Student must provide a notebook, pen and required supplies. Students may not clock in for school unless they are dressed according to policy, have books and their supplies to perform services.
5. A student will receive a warning if they leave their Education Center Area without prior approval.
6. A student who leaves school without permission and without clocking out will be clocked out at the time they were last seen by their instructor and will receive a warning.
7. Refusal to perform any clinic service will result in a warning being issued.
8. Students must adhere to the Break Policy. See page 16 for details.
9. Students must stay with their clients during chemical services.
10. Students must be at their station performing services on clients or manikins, or doing bookwork at all times.
11. Any equipment left in the school becomes property of the school if not picked up within 30 days of last day of attendance.
12. Students are not permitted visitors during class hours.
13. A beeper or cell phone must remain on monitor only while in class. Phone calls can only be returned on breaks determined by the instructor, outside of the building.

14. Students are not permitted to sell any products, crafts, or any items on the school premises.
15. Students may take photographs in school with permission from the administration, teachers and ALL persons being photographed.
16. Students may not fraternize at another student's place of employment, as a client or visitor, or with B.I.S.B. employees.
17. Any tuition that is not paid per contracted arrangements may be grounds for termination.
18. All enrolled students must have a phone number or a contact person with a phone number for a reference.
19. **NIGHT SCHOOL STUDENTS** that fall below satisfactory progress must be available to come to the school for counseling before 5:00 p.m.
20. B.I.S.B. will NOT be responsible for cash, credit cards or valuable items.
21. No student shall express discriminatory displays, actions or words towards any other student, staff or faculty member based on race, color, sex, sexual orientation, religion, ethnic origin, age or handicap.
22. No student shall verbalize disparaging or disrespectful remarks to any student, staff or faculty member.
23. Each student shall respectfully request acknowledgment by the instructor should they have a question or concern and refrain from otherwise interrupting the progress of the lecture. This promotes the concentrated atmosphere necessary for student comprehension of the material.
24. All facilities are designated as non-smoking.
25. No student shall engage in malicious destruction of School property.
26. No student shall use any illegal drugs, alcohol or tobacco products while on School property or attend School under the influence of such substances.
27. No student shall cheat on an examination or provide false information.
28. No student shall engage in any behavior that is legally defined by the government as sexual harassment.

Student Conduct

Students are expected to conduct themselves professionally while attending classes, working in a salon, or engaging in any activities sponsored by

B.I.S.B. Violations of student rules or conduct policy can constitute grounds for dismissal.

Tuition and Fees

Tuition and registration fees are listed per program. Kits and supplies can be purchased through the school or at local supply stores.

Financial Aid

Financial Aid is available to those who qualify.

The Financial Aid office requires an entrance interview with all prospective students. Materials regarding financial aid are distributed free of charge.

Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. participates in five federal programs of assistance – Federal Pell Grant, FSEOG, Federal Work Study and Federal Stafford Loans (subsidized and unsubsidized). The amount and type of financial aid offered is based upon financial need as determined by the federal government's system of need analysis. All students will qualify for loans, either through subsidized/unsubsidized guaranteed student loans; the exception would be a student who is in default on a previous student loan, or a student who has been convicted of possessing or selling illegal drugs.

Application Process

In order to apply for federal financial aid the student must complete the application for federal student Aid (FAFSA), and furnish the necessary documentation required for verification of information submitted. An interview is appropriate and required in almost all circumstances.

After the application is completed by the student, the information will be sent to a servicer-- to determine the financial aid eligibility. Once eligibility is determined, the financial aid office will develop a breakdown showing the estimated charges and the financial aid that will cover those charges.

Financial Aid Programs

FEDERAL PELL GRANT: A federal program of grants (gift) based on demonstrated financial need. Upon receipt of the Student Aid Report, it is signed by the student and used by this institution to receive aid for the student. The maximum annual award is \$4,050.00. It may change on an annual basis.

SUBSIDIZED FEDERAL DIRECT STAFFORD LOANS:

This is a low-interest, long term loan program available through the U.S. Department of Education. Special applications are available in the financial aid office. The loan is guaranteed by an agency of the federal government. Interest does not accrue and repayment does not begin while the student is attending an approved school at least on a half-time basis. There is usually a six month grace period after a student leaves school before repayment begins. This loan is based on financial need. **THIS IS A LOAN AND MUST BE REPAID BY THE STUDENT.** An origination fee and a guarantee fee are charged by the lender and deducted from the proceeds of each disbursement. The maximum that may be borrowed for the first year of academic school is \$2,625. **THIS IS A LOAN AND MUST BE REPAID BY THE STUDENT.**

UN-SUBSIDIZED FEDERAL DIRECT STAFFORD

LOANS: This is a loan guaranteed by the federal government. It is available to students who may require additional funds beyond the subsidized Stafford Loan. The government does not pay the interest while the student is attending school, but interest and principal can be deferred until six months after graduation, or it may be repaid while the student is attending school. Interest rates are identical to the subsidized Stafford Loans. It is strongly recommended that students borrow under this program only what is absolutely necessary to meet educational expenses. **THIS IS A LOAN AND MUST BE REPAID BY THE STUDENT.**

FSEOG: A gift award that is based on financial need. If you are awarded the Federal Pell Grant, you will receive first priority for this grant. An FSEOG does not require repayment.

Federal Work Study: Based on financial need. See Financial Aid for details.

** We are also approved for training grants from vocational rehabilitation and Veteran's training. See office for details.*

Evaluation/Dexterity/ Physical Challenges

If a person has any questions about the dexterity needed to be successful in our programs, an evaluation can be done for a fee of \$75.00. This evaluation takes one full day.

Transfer Policy Evaluation/Previous Training

Evaluation Fee \$200.00.

Credit for previous training will be evaluated based on a transcript of previous hours and services and granted if appropriate. The training time will be reduced appropriately and the student will be notified prior to enrollment. It will be the policy of Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc. to accept hours from another cosmetology school providing: a) Sufficient evidence is presented to our school that their programs are equivalent to Bene's International School of Beauty, Inc.; and b) A test is taken for the transfer of hours. If the student scores a 95-100, all hours will be credited. If the student scores a 94-75, the clock hours will be reduced appropriately prior to enrollment. **Transfer hours will only be evaluated prior to enrollment.**

- Score 95 -100 Certification immediate to take state exam
- 94 - 75 The clock hours are determined on an individual basis.

** If a student transfers from BISB it is up to the receiving school to evaluate the transcripts.*

Veterans Evaluation/ Previous Training

Credit for previous training will be evaluated and granted if appropriate. The training time and tuition will be reduced proportionately with the VA and the veteran student notified.

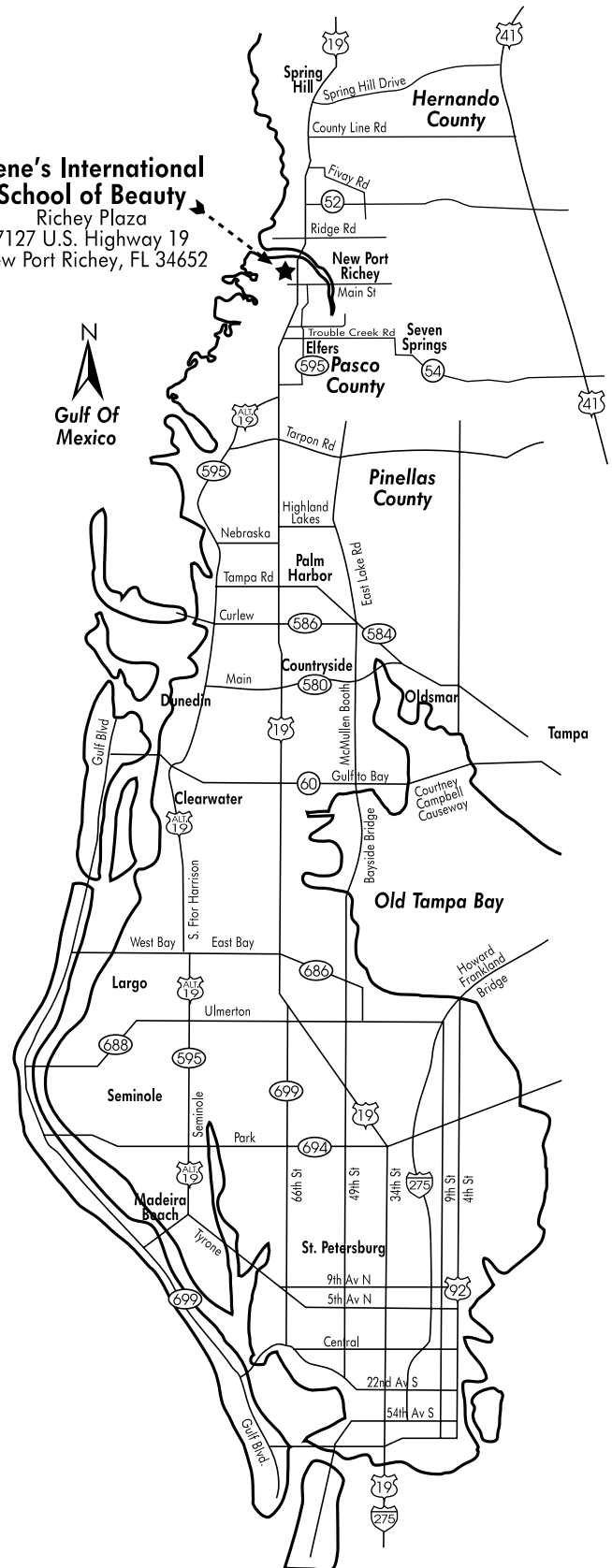
